DEI SURVEY RESPONSES DESCRIBE MEMBERSHIP



As you might expect, we are an older, middle class group of mostly white women. But we are also a group that favors greater DEI by an overwhelming margin: 99% of the survey respondents felt that this was either an "extremely important" or "very important" priority. The results reflect input from nearly 54% of our membership—also great news! And we are also increasingly an Appleton <u>AREA</u> membership. A good number (almost 40%) of us live outside of the city limits of Appleton.

There were some great suggestions to make our LWV more inclusive, such as providing child care, better audio systems, easier parking, and more frequent meetings. One hundred percent of us like email, and over 91% have figured out Zoom. Texting and Facebook were also popular, but, as you might expect from an older demographic, Instagram and Snapchat were pretty far down on the list of preferred technology options.

There were some great ideas offered to increase DEI such as offering more programs specific to that topic, holding events in a variety of places around the community, strengthening relations with high schools and colleges, and offering voter assistance to under-served communities. Another idea put forth was having small group "diversity circles" to share insights and learn more about white privilege. We should keep our membership fees affordable, reach out to more men, and partner with other organizations, especially youth.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to respond to the survey. Making the LWV more diverse, equitable, and inclusive is the way forward, and we will go in that direction!

Appleton League Voter Services Vice President Jacqui Klimaszewski is being honored by the League of Women Voters of Wisconsin as recipient of its 2020 Meg McLane Award for Advocacy for her depth of work as a talented, hardworking advocate. The Meg McLane Award for Advocacy was established by the LWV Wisconsin State Board 13 years ago to recognize outstanding individuals advocating for positive change in their communities and throughout Wisconsin. It also honors the dedicated work of Meg McLane, a longtime member of the Fond du Lac League and chair of the state Legislative Committee for several years.

Jacqui has focused on building relationships with diverse communities and reaching disenfranchised voters in the Fox Valley. Through collaborations with high schools, local colleges, the technical college and a student marketing program, Jacqui has developed voter assistance that is school-based and student driven.

Jacqui, a retired educator who has been involved in educational advocacy her entire career, has collaborated with the Hmong Partnership, the Latinx community, Juneteenth, Pillars, B.A.B.E.S, the Salvation Army, the Appleton Public Library, the History Museum at the Castle, and community health organizations to provide voter assistance at their facilities.

With her recruiting and organizational skills, Jacqui has developed a Voter Services Team of League members and non-members who work on voter assistance throughout the Fox Valley. Jacqui is an outstanding facilitator at conducting candidate forums for which she has received positive feedback from both sides of the aisle.

Jacqui is admired and respected as a tireless advocate. She lives out the League mission of empowering voters and defending democracy. Congratulations, Jacqui, for the well-deserved state recognition for dedicated and conscientious service.

HOW TO EXAMINE ACTION THROUGH A DEI LENS

When viewing your work through a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion lens, start by asking these questions.

- Who is involved in the process?
 - Are key stakeholders meaningfully included?
 - o Is this work that impacts a group or community? If so, is their voice represented?
 - o How diverse is the group of decision-makers? Is it diverse enough?
- Who will be impacted?
 - O Who benefits from this?
 - O Who is burdened by this?
 - o Does this help us meet the needs of underserved voters?
 - o Have we considered various, specific marginalized groups and how they might be impacted?
- What are the intended and unintended outcomes?
 - O What issue are we trying to solve?
 - O What do we hope will happen?
 - O What are the potential negative impacts? Who could be hurt by this?
 - O What data or evidence supports this?
 - O How might this be perceived by others?
- Does this align with our vision for an equitable and inclusive organization?
 - o How is equity addressed?
 - O What barriers might this place in the way of achieving equity?
 - O How does this impact the League's culture?
 - O What changes could be made to make this more equitable?

- Other local races requiring a primary

The Wisconsin LWV encourages all voters to make their plan to vote and consider voting absentee in the August 11 and November 3 elections.

COLLEGE OUTREACH EFFORTS

"ASK YOUR COLLEGE" URGES CAMPUSES TO DRIVE STUDENT VOTER REGISTRATION

"Ask Your College" is a nonpartisan volunteer campaign to urge colleges and universities to empower eligible students to vote and, in fact, try to reach a goal of full student participation. Volunteers reach out to the leadership of a campus they care about to challenge the campus to work toward this goal. Foundation for Civic Leadership hosts this campaign, and offers an Action Kit for volunteers.

Here's what YOU can do:

- Send a letter. The most direct approach is to edit the appropriate sample president's letter and email it directly to the college president. We recommend copying the Vice President of Student Affairs. When you send a letter via email, please bcc askyourcollegecampaign@gmail.com.
- **Recruit others to join your ask**. If you have contacts with other college community members such as faculty, alumni, and others you might choose to recruit them to co-sign the letter to the president.
